High	Substantial improvements should be made to reduce the level to an acceptable level. Risk reduction measures should be implemented urgently with a defined period. Activities in this category <b>MUST</b> have a written method statement/safe system of work and arrangements <b>MUST</b> be made to ensure that the controls are maintained and monitored for adequacy.
